Our heartfelt greetings to all of you from the HRDC family in Nepal.

HRDC is no stranger to challenges. When I returned to Nepal in 1977 the healthcare system was primitive. Over the years we successfully built HRDC as the country struggled through political unrest, a ten-year civil war, floods, the 2015 earthquakes, a tenuous democracy, and now the pandemic. At every step, our supporters have stood with us, ensuring our indomitable teams could carry on in the face of so much turmoil. The commitment and fortitude of the staff is matched only by the courage of the children whose lives are transformed.

Thanks to you, we are meeting the challenges of COVID-19 head on. Our strict safety protocols have kept the hospital and satellite centers functioning without any infections. Socially distanced mobile medical camps continue and the Mobile Ponseti team sets out on motorcycles to ensure children undergoing clubfoot treatment can have their casts changed at home. Working closely with our partner hospital B&B Hospital, a 64-bed COVID Ward has treated more than 375 people to date.

The HRDC teams are undeterred in their commitment to treating these precious children. Thank you for making this healing work possible.

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**Enabling Disabled Children** 

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Meet Bhagwati Shahi

B hagwati's home is in Dailekh, a high hilly area in western Nepal. Like many families in that area, her parents work as subsistence farmers, each earning approximately \$0.50 per day. Playing outside one day, Bhagwati tumbled and broke her leg. What should have been a routine childhood injury turned into a dangerous bone infection when her parents couldn't afford proper treatment. More than 30% of our patients are admitted with advanced infections, burns, and neglected injuries. Over several months Bhagwat's pain became agonizing and she could barely stand. The Community-based Rehabilitation worker in the area learned of her injury and encouraged her family to seek treatment at HRDC.

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
Thanks to our safety protocols, the hospital remains open without any COVID-19 infections. Bhagwati was admitted and is now staying at HRDC with an older sister while she receives treatment. Surgery removed the infected bone, and the Ilizarov fixator rings are helping new bone to grow. She's also happily attending the HRDC school. When she returns home, the hourlong walk to the nearest school – where she's in first grade – will be easy.
