Greetings of 2022 to each one of you. With COVID recurring in serial waves it has been a challenging year in Nepal, as it must be in one way or another for all of you. Your kindness throughout the pandemic has enabled our teams to operate and innovate daily to meet the needs of more than 17,347 children last year.

Strict safety protocols have kept the hospital and satellite centers functioning without any infections. Telemedicine continues and mobile medical camps were conducted in 22 districts, reaching more than 8,581 children. The inventive Ponseti teams – who apply casts for clubfoot treatment – set out on motorcycles to reach young patients who can't travel to the satellite centers. With grit, determination, and tender loving care our teams are overcoming each challenge.

In the midst of much pain and suffering in the world, HRDC stands as a beacon of hope. I can feel the new energy emanating from the young team that spearheads the activities of HRDC. Children are receiving life-changing surgeries and treatment. Their futures are now filled with opportunities, dignity, and hope.

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Put to the test

Dr. Bibek Banskota, HRDC's Executive Director, leads with a philosophy of compassion. "When you think of a family who has a disabled child but does not have enough to eat, the child's disability rarely makes it to the priority list, and we are very aware of that. When COVID hit, we decided not to close the hospital for even one day."

As the waves of COVID infections surged through Nepal last year, the HRDC teams were put to the test and the staff of 230 rose to meet every challenge with grit, determination, and ingenuity. They immediately mobilized to create safe environments for everyone. A quarantine facility was set up, ensuring that every child and guardian receives a COVID PCR test prior to entering the hospital. The hospital remains open with zero infections, and 1,322 surgeries were successfully performed.

In the field 31 mobile medical camps were carried out, reaching 22 districts. In addition to seeing new patients, the teams delivered and fit new orthotic and prosthetic devices to children undergoing long-term rehabilitation. And, when the children undergoing Ponseti clubfoot treatment couldn't travel to the clinics, the staff set out on motorcycles to reach children in their homes.
